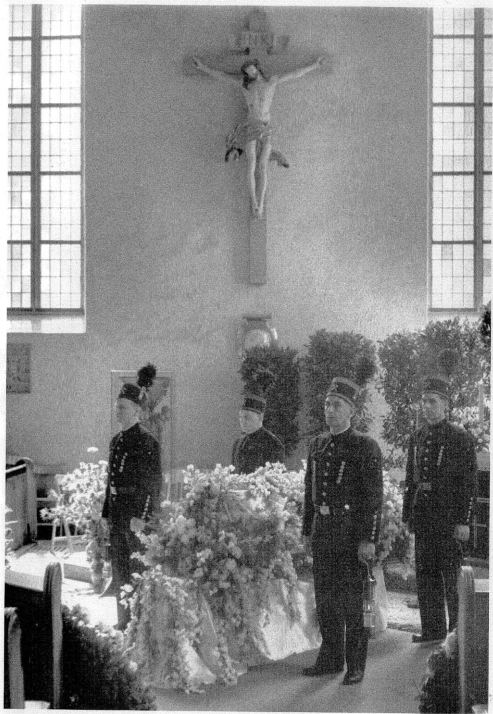
FREUDENSTADT, Germany, 11th August, 1961 - The inscription on the pillow in Dr. Buchman's room is a poem written by his brother:
